

 - Formed in response to NSABB draft proposal
- Newsletter updates: societies, FASEB
 Washington Update





Survey of Societies, Leadership

- Only one FASEB society has a committee related to dual use research (AAI); journal participation, local IBCs
- The rest rate the issue as:



- Low priority
- Not something they're hearing from members about
- Very low level of awareness
- "Dual use research? What's that? I've never heard of it."
- Addressing through other societies??



Taint of regulatory burden

- Staff briefings on NSABB, dual use issue
- During survey, societies referred members to NSABB website
- First reaction
 - Negative, regulatory burden, government security policies
 - Not seen as a research responsibility issue
- Hot topics for '08: federal funding & regulatory burden
- NSABB should keep this in mind for outreach activities








Solutions for outreach
